V.	Reports of	Chair: The Board Retreat will take place on June 1 st at 8:30am at the SAU PDC.
	Administration	Superintendent: Mr. Feneberg reported that he attended the National Society Induction and Book Awards at the high school, the Band and Chorus concert last night as well as the Memorial Day celebration at Simonds School.
		The Superintendent shared that he forwarded a copy of the federal assurances he is required to sign annual for the district to receive federal grant money. The instructions include a requirement that he consult with the LEA Board about the content and responsibilities of the LEA. There has been previous discussion about many of the basic principles of federal grants, such as "supplement not supplant", "consultation with private schools in the district", parent involvement and information, and equitable distribution among eligible schools. He asked if there any questions or the need for clarification, please let him know.
		A school funding presentation will be held on June 19 th at 6:00pm. He noted the change in venue from KRHS to KRMS. He asked the Board for clarification with regard to advertising the event. <i>Ms. Casey made the motion to advertise in the Shopper and Intertown. Dr. Bobruff seconded.</i> There was Board discussion. <i>The motion failed 3-4-2.</i> There was consensus to advertise through our own media and to promote without spending money. Mr. Bartholomew suggested reporters be notified. Mr. Feneberg will also plan a press release.
		The Superintendent updated members regarding the acceptance of federal and state funds through additional grants: Title IV (\$75,000), IDEA redistribution (\$82,000) and smart energy purchases (\$50,000).
4	5	Mr. Feneberg reported that Dr. Kellogg, KHRS teacher, attended a conference recently and was credited with saving a man's life; he was CPR/First Aid certified through our district's professional development process.
		Assistant Superintendent: Mr. Bessette reported that the Title IV grant the Superintendent spoke of is exciting because of how it will tie into culture and climate and explained to members how this will occur through work on: safe and healthy schools, cyberbullying, social-emotional needs, caring school communities and rural poverty. It is planned to expand work on the elementary

level regarding caring school communities and work with middle school to redesign middle school advisories. Accessibility to band instruments for students who find rental equipment prohibitive was discussed to potentially close

Business Administrator [Heard after Resignations/Nominations]

Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the purchase request for propane in the amount of \$1.699 per gallon through Energy North Propane for 2019-2020 as presented. Mr. Pinard seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.

Staff Representative Report: In Health class at the elementary schools, students are using a new free health app on the iPads created by the Centers for Disease Control to learn about brain injury and concussions. New London fourth graders just took a wonderful field trip to its very own Historical Society/Village and learned about colonial life, paralleling their study of the American Colonies and the Revolution. Ms. Perkins' fifth graders wrote letters to the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, asking about the provenance of their collection of Benin Bronzes. Dr. Kathryn Gunsch, curator of the exhibit, sent a fascinating letter to the class, explaining how the museum acquired the bronzes and invited the students to have a video tour of the Gallery.

Next Thursday and Friday, May 30 and 31, the middle school drama club and tech crew are presenting "Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory" at 7:00pm. Next Wednesday, May 29, is Step-up Day. The sixth grade teams and students are preparing for our new student body. Sixth and seventh graders will give tours, and incoming students will have a chance to meet all the teachers in cluster areas. Sixth grade social studies classes are building civilizations on Minecraft EDU. Students are showing what they know about what makes up a civilization. They will be using Screencastify to narrate a tour of their civilization and will place this artifact in their digital portfolios!

The High School Music department has been busy this year. They have had many guest artists come in and work with music students. Dr. Danielle Moreau, Adjunct Professor of Percussion at UNH, worked with our percussion students in December. Dr. Nate Jorgsenson, Professor of Saxophone and Jazz Studies at UNH, worked with the Jazz Band and Saxophones in January. The Freese Brothers Big Band gave a free performance with the KRHS Jazz Band in February. Lydnsey Boysen, Adjunct professor at UNH and SNHU, worked with the Concert Band in April. Mark Shilansky, Professor of Music at Berklee, wrote a piece of music with the Jazz Band. The Faculty Jazz Quintet (featuring Mark Shilansky, Piano, Sarah Kervin, Voice, Dr. Nathan Jorgensen, Alto Sax, Keala Kaumeheiwa, Bass, Les Harris, Jr. Drum Set) performed. All of this is possible because of support from our administration, school board, and community! Senior Corbin Montminy was a proud Kearsarge representative in the All State Band in April. Junior Patrick Seward sang the "Trilogy"; Bass voice in the Chamber Music Festival at UNH in January; tenor voice at the Jazz All-State Music Festival at Pinkerton in February; and baritone voice at the Classical All-State Festival in April. 	Student Representative Report: Mr. Fortier reported on the Juniors' state science test, the Seniors NH Scholar outing to the Eisher Cats and Six Flags trip. He also noted spring sports are wrapping up.
VI. Public Comment	Dr. Bobruff commented on the loss of utensil ware at the high school and middle school. Apparently there is a tremendous loss, particularly at the high school. There was a thorough discussion by members. Dr. Bobruff stated the Wellness Committee would like to see something done about it. Mr. Feneberg felt it needed further investigation. Mr. Paterson, KMRS Principal, stated he spoke with cafeteria staff just last week and they reported things were going well and didn't notice any significant
	Mr. Pinard presented a prepared statement [attached] regarding the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance at Board meetings. Mr. Pinard made the motion not to recite the Pledge of Allegiance at Board meetings. Mr. Cancio-Bello seconded. There was a very thorough discussion. Mr. Pinard thanked members for their thoughtful discussion. Mr. Pinard withdrew the motion and Mr. Cancio-Bello withdrew the second.
	Members also addressed school taxes, specifically the increases in Bradford and Sutton.
VII. New Business	A. <u>Project C.L.I.M.B.</u> : A request for withdrawal of \$5,400 for hut rental for hiking trips planned for the 2019-202 school year was presented. This money will pay for two hut trips next fall with deposit money due in advance. <i>Mr. Pinard made the motion approve the withdrawal of \$5,400 from Project C.L.I.M.B. as presented. Mr. Cancio-Bello seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.</i>
	B. <u>Technology Purchases</u> : Mr. Schaub came forward with a purchase recommendation for up to 360 Chromebooks to replace student devices per the five-year cycle. Chromebooks will be supporting high school 1:1 program as well as nine elementary school carts and grade three classroom typing. W.B. Mason and CDW-G and Zones includes optional device pre-provisioning (unboxing, domain enrollment, inventory, other setup) which will save two

technicians eighty hours-worth of time during the summer. CDW-G was chosen based on prior experience and ability to ship devices early July. Mr. Pinard noted this was not the lowest bidder. Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the purchase recommendation for CDW-G for up to an amount of \$79,920 for the purchase of Chromebooks per the five-year cycle as presented. Dr. Bobruff seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.

Mr. Schaub also brought forward with a purchase recommendation for up to 60 Lenovo laptops to support the five-year replacement cycle of staff computers. The lowest bidder, Connection, is recommended. *Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the purchase recommendation of Connection for an amount up to \$49,705.20 as presented for up to sixty staff laptops as presented per the five-year replacement cycle. Mr. Wright seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.*

Mr. Schaub brought forward a purchase recommendation for 24 Lenovo laptops to support the five-year replacement cycle of student computers. These computers support the KRHS Science program. Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the purchase recommendation for Connection in an amount of \$19,882.08 for twenty-four laptops as presented per the five-year replacement cycle as presented. Dr. Bobruff seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.

C. New England Center for Children (NECC): Mr. Elliott, Director of Student Support Services, presented information regarding this new program at KRHS. He requested the Board approve a purchase recommendation for NECC to provide a certified teacher to work with students and a BCBA to train paraeducators and other teachers as a result of student need and staffing. These learned skills will be carried down to the middle and elementary schools. This is a sole source. Mr. Feneberg noted this is an opportunity to keep students indistrict. It's an opportunity to replicate the program with the secondary benefit of staff training. Mr. Cushing made the motion to approve the purchase recommendation for NECC in the amount of \$265,000 as presented. Mr. Cancio-Bello seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0. Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the budgetary transfer from out-of-district special education to special education contracted services as presented. Mr. Cancio-Bello seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.

D. <u>Summer Projects:</u> Mr. Fleury asked for a motion from the Board to reject previous bids for the athletic storage sheds in order to proceed with an alternative. *Mr. Pinard made the motion to reject previous bids for the KRHS athletic storage shed. Dr. Bobruff seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.*

Mr. Fleury present a sole source much more affordable alternative for the KRHS athletic storage shed. This structure comes with a second floor. The district will provide the slab, electrical, asphalt and paint. *Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the sole source purchase recommendation of LaValley Middleton Building Supply in the amount of \$85,722.00 as presented for the KRHS athletics storage shed. Mr. Pinard seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.* Mr. Fleury brought forward the recommendation for an FPE panel replacement.

Rexel is the vendor of choice to offer us an engineered and specially sized solution to replace the 15 FPE panels. Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve \$33,380.80 to Rexel for FPE panel replacement as presented. Mr. Pinard seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0. Mr. Pinard made the motion to approve the budgetary transfer to maintenance electrical as presented. Mr. Cancio-Bello seconded. The motion carried 8-0-0.

Mr. Fleury presented a purchase recommendation for a new tractor. Knoxland is a local vendor that has been very reliable and offered excellent service to our district. Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the purchase recommendation for anew tractor in the amount of \$39,920.00 as presented. Dr. Bobruff seconded. The motion carried 7-0-0. [Ms. Mastin left the meeting just prior to this motion.] Mr. Pinard made the motion to approve the budgetary transfer to new equipment as presented. Mr. Cancio-Bello seconded. The motion carried 7-0-0.

Mr. Fleury presented a sole source purchase recommendation for security cameras as Simonds and Sutton Central Elementary Schools. Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the sole source purchase for Tasco Security in the amount of \$30,000.00 for security camera installation at Sutton Central and Simonds Schools as presented. Dr. Bobruff seconded. The motion carried 7-0-0. Mr. Cancio-Bello made the motion to approve the budgetary transfer to capital improvements as presented. Dr. Bobruff seconded. The motion carried 7-0-0.

[Ms. Casey left the meeting.]

Mr. Fleury presented a budgetary transfer for approval. Dr. Bobruff made the motion to approve the budgetary transfer for electrical upgrades at the high school. Mr. Pinard seconded. The motion carried 6-0-0.

Mr. Fleury brought forward a purchase recommendation for asbestos abatement and testing at Simonds School. *Dr. Bobruff made the motion to approve the purchase recommendation for The Lawson Group in the amount of \$13,705.00 for classroom asbestos abatement and testing at Simonds School. Mr. Cancio-Bello seconded. The motion carried 6-0-0.*
